Madi's brought tears to my eyes as she understood so well

Rahab lived in Jericho; a town that hated God, with a family who hated God, and friends who hated God. Everything in her life told her to worship other gods and disobey God's laws, but Rahab was different. When the Israelite spies came to Jericho, Rahab hid them from the king. Then she told them in Joshua 2, that she believed their God was the one true God. She had heard the stories of the lands the Israelites had conquered and the miracles their God had done. Because of her belief, when the walls of Jericho came down, God spared Rahab and her family. Rahab had a fortress, the walls of Jericho, but she knew that fortress would not protect her, so she put her faith in the true fortress, God. He protected her when the walls of Jericho were falling.

Turn to Psalm 18.

While turning.. (story)

Live in the middle of nowhere

It is 15 miles to the closest grocery store, 45 minutes to the closest Chipotle

We don't have a lot of crime in our area, but we do have wild animals

Big bear outside my window - Panic

Walls and doors make a big difference

Help me sleep at night

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Let's look at Psalm 18, where David describes God as a place of safety.

Psalm 18:1-6 (ESV)

¹ I love you, O LORD, my strength.

David starts by expressing his intimate feelings toward God

² The LORD is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer, my God, my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold.

David is used to God providing for Him. David trusts God.

David has a relationship with God. David knows Him.

Rock and my fortress, my rock

The first rock is the word (Sell-uh) that refers to rocky cliffs. Picture a fortress on a seaside cliff that is inaccessible to enemies because getting to the fortress isn't possible.

The second rock isn't just repetition. Its the word sur (tsurl) and gives us an image of solid ground, like the kind you would build a house or fortress on.

God is unbeatable and one that we can build our lives on.

Horn of my salvation

Could be a horn that was blown to call an army, an army that would save a king in need.

Could be the horn of an ox that was used for work and war alike.

Either way, it was an animal horn that shows God saves

³ I call upon the LORD, who is worthy to be praised, and I am saved from mv enemies.

Called on the Lord, who is worthy to be praised

David recognized that God was and is worthy of praise

What death are you going through?

Sheol and grave are often used interchangeably.

We have all been through a time of "death".

Sometimes its a major thing, like the death or sickness of a loved one.

Sometimes we go through a period or moment where we feel alone.

I resonated with Daniel Frank's sermon and story of loss and seeing Jesus as life, even in death.

Sometimes its a small thing, that hits hard

I don't know what death you are going through, but

Like David, you aren't alone.

Talk to God about it.

God wants a relationship with us.

The veil between us and the holy of holies is torn.

We can connect with God through Jesus Christ.

Get Connected.

I love my church community.

I look forward to Sundays and wish I could spend time with my church family. When I have to travel and visit other churches, I miss my people.

Get connected.

Some of my closest friends are those I serve with at church or camp.

It takes time to get close, and Bible studies and serving together connect us.

David isn't whining to complain.

Cords of death encompass me.

Torrents of destruction assail me.

Charissa and I have talked a lot about verses like this.

Here David reminds us of kids.

His description seems extreme, but he wants to be clear how dire things were when God provided

Its not whining. It is his description of how bad it was when God showed up.

Sometimes as a parent, my kids sound whiny, but they are actually telling me what is wrong, or that they are hurt.

In devotions, I was reading in <u>Exodus 16</u>, where the Israelites are in a dire situation of not having food and whining.

Exodus 16:3 "3 and the people of Israel said to them, "Would that we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the meat pots and ate bread to the full, for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger.""

At this point, the dad in me says, Really?!?

You'd rather be a slave? Because you ate better?!

Exodus 16:9–12 "9 Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole congregation of the people of Israel, 'Come near before the Lord, for he has heard your grumbling.' "10 And as soon as Aaron spoke to the whole congregation of the people of Israel, they looked toward the wilderness, and behold, the glory of the Lord appeared in the cloud. 11 And the Lord said to Moses, 12 "I have heard the grumbling of the people of Israel. Say to them, 'At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall be filled with bread. Then you shall know that I am the Lord your God.' ""

Curry dinner recently

When he didn't eat it, we told him he would eat it tomorrow.

And in the morning, you will be filled with curry and rice and if you don't eat it then, you will be filled at lunch.

God, being a good Father, heard their need in the grumbling.

Do you ever get the opportunity to hear grumbling?

I didn't understand passages like this until I had kids.

God is patient and provides meat for dinner and bread in the morning.

I've been working on bringing more to the Lord in prayer.

The good, the bad, the major, and the minor.

God, being a good Father, hears us too.

Exodus 16:16–20 "16 This is what the Lord has commanded: 'Gather of it, each one of you, as much as he can eat. You shall each take an omer, according to the number of the persons that each of you has in his tent.' "17 And the people of Israel did so. They gathered, some more, some less. 18 But when they measured it with an omer, whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no

lack. Each of them gathered as much as he could eat. 19 And Moses said to them, "Let no one leave any of it over till the morning." 20 But they did not listen to Moses. Some left part of it till the morning, and it bred worms and stank. And Moses was angry with them."

This is me.

I know I would have gathered more than I was told. Maybe you would have been with me.

It says that many people did gather too much and it rotted and got worms.

Moses wasn't happy, because they didn't listen, but probably also because of the smell.

I love God's provision here.

God isn't a cold and distant wall.

Exodus 16:22–24 "22 On the sixth day they gathered twice as much bread, two omers each. And when all the leaders of the congregation came and told Moses, 23 he said to them, "This is what the Lord has commanded: 'Tomorrow is a day of solemn rest, a holy Sabbath to the Lord; bake what you will bake and boil what you will boil, and all that is left over lay aside to be kept till the morning.' "24 So they laid it aside till the morning, as Moses commanded them, and it did not stink, and there were no worms in it."

It's amazing that God made the mana to rot instantly in not trusting God and last an extra day to provide for His people a day of rest.
